Pastor's Thoughts: "The Resurrection Should Be Televised"

"Let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven" – Matthew 5:16

I have been giving it *a lot* of thought lately. What makes North Congregational special/unique? What is the *one thing* that makes this church different from all of the other churches I have served? What special ministry does NCC have to give to the world? If there's anything that I think everyone would agree to, it's that "NCC is *kind...* in the name of Christ". Even as a small fellowship, no Sunday goes by where kindness and community doesn't happen here. You can see it in the passing of the peace. You can see it at coffee hour. If you are in the choir, you can see it in the smiles and giggles that happen just before church. You can see it in Bible Study as people pass around ideas about scripture and help each other out. You can see it at missions' meetings or discussions about Peach Festival. You can see it in deacons meetings and the prayer circle. You could see it in private conversations, if they *weren't* private -- but, of course, they must remain so.

"People enjoy each other's company" and "It's like a family here". We do things because "it's the Christian thing to do". These are things I hear all the time. In short, *this is a good, Christian church* and one I enjoy being the interim for. But if I weren't here, I wouldn't know all the good works and kind faces that North Congregational Church in New Hartford has to offer.

As we approach Easter, and I'm thinking about the resurrection, I wonder what would have happened if the three women who ran from the empty tomb that day *just became nice people*, but didn't tell anyone about the experience? What would happen if the disciples became a great community, *but never left the building where they heard the Good News*? We wouldn't be here today. Whatever good Christianity has done in the world beyond Roman-occupied Israel wouldn't have happened. It wouldn't detract from the beauty of the way people were *inside* the community, but it wouldn't be the same to the rest of the world.

The resurrection needed to be "televised", and *it was* using the technology of the times: the human voice, and later the written word. When we think of "television", we think of that box that sits in our living rooms where we can watch football or movies or whatever. In reality, the word for that box comes from two Greek words "tele", which means "far away" and "vision", which means "sight" – being able to see from far away. Mary and the women, the disciples and, later, Paul televised the resurrection in their own way.

Now, we must do the same, in ours. We must televise. We must publicize. We must evangelize. *Before you freak out about that, hear me out.* Yankees are notably quiet about their faith -- because they are *polite*. No polite person would ever talk about politics, religion or sexuality in polite society – and being polite is a good thing. I know this. *I'm a Yankee, too*. I have opinions about *everything*, but I wouldn't ever foist those opinions on someone unless they asked me to or began the topic. It's not my place to impose on someone else. Needless to say, this makes it hard to tell the Good News about what is here at New Hartford. That's where social media comes in, and here's why:

You don't have to actually make a fuss to be on social media. You don't have to tell long stories or write lengthy, impersonal committee reports for it. You just have to do what you already do: Be kind for Christ and let pictures tell the story. If you have a camera on your phone (like most people do), and you see kindness happening here, take a picture. Send the picture via email or message to the church. We'll figure out how to put it on the Web – on our website, on our Facebook page, on Instagram or Snapchat if we get those (no, I don't really know what those *are* yet, but I'm learning).

If you think that seeing kindness has no effect on the world, former Vice-President Joe Biden spoke with a homeless man the other day, *without knowing he was being filmed*, and that simple kindness was viewed 130,000 times! The world is hungry to know that kindness still exists *and we have buckets of it here*.

We can advertise big events in advance, we can publish sermons if you'd like, we can share theological insights from the Bible Study group, we can show pictures of kids playing or singing or whatever. For people who can't get to church on a Sunday, we could videotape it week by week and put it on the web. We could put audio recordings of the choir out there, and so on. No matter what we choose to do, because privacy *is* still important, we will never put things out there without *your* permission so you don't have to worry.

If you're not comfortable with all of that, "televise" the church in your own way. If you know about the Tag Sale, tell someone about it. If you heard a good sermon, tell someone about it. If you like the coffee, mention that in passing. Give someone a ride to church if you think they'd like it. *No standing on street corners with tracts is required for this kind of (dare I say it?) evangelism.* We're still Yankees, after all.

I hope you'll help in some way or another, at whatever your comfort level is, because the resurrection *should be* televised.

Council members are working on enhancing our social media presence, specifically our website (northchurchucc.com) and our Facebook page. We have hired a consultant to advise us.

We are exploring ways to advertise the use of our building to generate more revenue. Some ideas are office space, classes, and meetings. Any other ideas?

Upcoming events include concerts in April and August, a rummage/tag sale in May, quarterly community dinners (next one is April 27th), and the Peach Fest/Craft Fair is August 25th. A peach fest meeting will be scheduled in April, date to be determined; all are welcome. Stay tuned for specific dates for events!

Social issues that NCC engages in include donations to local food banks thanks to the monthly Fourth Sunday food collection. In April, there will be a documentary film followed by a discussion period about reducing gun violence. In May, the Winsted Area Peace Action group will be using fellowship hall to judge peace posters that local school children have produced (see https://peaceposter.weebly.com/).

We want to develop approaches to attract more folks to worship in addition to understanding why participation is in decline. Christian education for youngsters is a crucial part of our outreach. Donna Howard and Gail Embrey, delegates to the UCC conference, have many new ideas to share with the congregation regarding these contemporary concerns.

We welcome everyone's input to these issues as we work with Rev. John during this interim period. Of note is that NCC's 200th anniversary will be on 12/25/2028, only 10 years away.
